1. COURSE GOALS

The aim of the course is:

- ✓ to examine the theory of constitutional law of foreign countries, general concepts and categories of the science of constitutional (state) law in their system;
- ✓ to get students to master the methodology of legal analysis of the norms of constitutional (state) law of foreign countries and the activities of state bodies and public institutions of foreign countries based on the comparative legal aspect;
- ✓ to explore the influence of political, economic, socio-cultural and moral factors on constitutional and legal norms and practice;
- ✓ to examine the variety of options for constitutional and legal regulation and find the most expedient, effective (ideal) model focused on universal values, and clarify the possibilities of its application in certain specific historical conditions.
