## 1. COURSE GOAL:

The main goal of the course is to introduce students to the comparative-historical method and its results in modern world linguistics. The discipline Comparative and Historical Linguistics involves an integrative approach to the studies of the language genealogical classification, related languages and families of languages. The discipline includes studies based on historical principle.

The course focuses on the comparison of languages on phonetic and grammatical level and genealogical classification of languages. Based on the works by W. Humboldt, F. Bopp, R. Rask, J. Grimm, A. Schleicher, G. Paul, G. Schuchardt it uncovers the mechanisms of languages historical development.

The course is designed to teach highly skilled specialists in theoretical and applied linguistics, capable of taking into account scientific and research expertise and apply their knowledge and skills in their future professional activities. The objective of the course is to produce original scientific research contributing to the generation, expansion and development of the scientific knowledge as well as the formation and development of the students' competences.
